

# About Your Octreoscan

## *What You Need to Know and Do*

An octreoscan is an imaging test. A small amount of radioactive material (called a tracer) is injected into your body.

The radioactive material is safe. It helps detect certain tumors in your body.

The octreoscan is a 2-day study. During your first visit, you will be injected with the tracer. After 4 hours, we will take your first set of images. You will come back after 24 hours, and we will take your second set of images.

### What should I do before my test?

- Make sure your doctor knows if you are (or could be) pregnant, or are breastfeeding.
- Let your doctor know of any medicines you are taking, including vitamins, herbs, and over-the-counter medicine. Some of them may need to be stopped in the days before the test.

Let your technologist know if you are:

- taking any medicines
- had recent X-rays or tests that use any substances, such as barium
- have had recent surgery
- have other health problems, such as diabetes, or any allergies

### What will happen during my test?

- During Day 1:
  - A technologist will explain the test to you and answer any questions you have.
  - A small amount of radioactive material will be injected into a vein in your arm. This will take about 15 minutes.
  - You will wait 4 hours. This allows the radioactive material time to go through your body. You can eat and drink during this time.
  - After the 4 hours are up, the first set of images will be taken. This will take about 30 to 45 minutes.
  - You will go home and can eat a light dinner. You will be given instructions about taking a laxative at night to prepare for the second day of testing.
- During Day 2:
  - You can eat a light breakfast before you come for the second day of your test.
  - Your second set of images will be taken. This will take 1 to 2 hours.

### What should I do after my test?

- You can go home shortly after the test. You can return to your normal activities right after the test.
- Your doctor will contact you and discuss the test results with you. This will probably happen a few days after the test.
